## **General Discussion Questions on Injustice**

#### How is injustice portrayed in the story?

What forms of injustice (racial, social, economic, legal, etc.) are present? Which characters are affected most directly by these injustices?

### How do the characters respond to injustice?

Do they resist, accept, or ignore it? What motivates their response? Are there consequences for their actions or inactions?

# What role does society or the legal system play in perpetuating injustice in the story?

Are the institutions portrayed as fair or corrupt? How does the author critique these systems?

### Can the injustice in the story be resolved?

Is there hope for change or justice by the end of the narrative? How does the resolution (or lack thereof) affect your interpretation of the message?

#### How does the setting influence the injustice in the story?

Does time, place, or culture play a key role in shaping the conflict? Could the story take place in another setting and still be effective?

#### Is anyone complicit in the injustice without directly causing it?

What is the moral responsibility of bystanders in the story? What parallels can you draw to real-world events?

# How does the author use literary devices (symbolism, irony, tone) to highlight injustice?

Are there particular scenes or symbols that stand out?

#### What does the story suggest about the relationship between power and justice?

Who holds power in the story, and how do they use it? Does power corrupt the characters or the system?

#### Is the injustice in the story still relevant today?

Can you find modern parallels to the injustices portrayed? What lessons can contemporary readers take from the story?
